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## AS/A Level grades awarded in a year unlike any other

Today, the Joint Council for Qualifications (JCQ) publishes the 2021 national results for A and AS Levels.

The GCE A Level, AS and GCSE examinations in England were cancelled in an announcement by the UK government in January 2021. Teachers instead determined grades this summer, using a range of evidence that reflected the content their students had been taught. Similar approaches were also applied to other regulated qualifications delivered in Northern Ireland and Wales.

Schools and colleges worked tremendously hard throughout the year, while students showed remarkable resilience to achieve in a year where Covid impacted the education sector and individuals in different ways.

Exam boards supported schools and colleges through the provision of extensive assessment materials, guidance and training, and external quality assurance checks.

Given the approach to determining grades in 2021 has been different from any previous summer, the overall grade distribution in 2021 was always likely to look different from 2020 and years when exams took place. It is therefore difficult to draw comparisons with previous sets of results.

Partly reflecting demographic changes, this summer saw an increase in the number of A Level entries, bouncing back from a drop in 2020.

- Overall outcomes (England, Wales & NI) increased at A\* and A-A\* (i.e. A and above):
  - A\* increased by 4.8 percentage points (pp) from 2020
  - A\*-A increased by 6.3pp in 2021 from 2020
  - Pass rates declined slightly by 0.2pp from 2020
- Female students performed better than male students:
  - At A\* female students increased by 5.3pp and male students increased by 4.2pp
  - At A\*-A female students increased by 7.0pp and male students by 5.4pp
  - A Level maths female students overtook male students for the first time in the number of A\* grades achieved – with 29.1% getting an A\* compared with 28.5% of male students
